CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS IN COLUMBIA

Saint Ambrose School welcomed our first exchange student this fall from Columbia. We sat down with JUAN, 8th grade, to learn more about him and how his family in Columbia celebrates Christmas.

1. What are some Christmas traditions in Colombia?

Answer: "The nine days of Novena de Aguinaldos, is when most people in their houses sing some villancicos and share with the family to sing to God in the Christmas tree and in the manger. On the night of December 7 there is a display of lights, lighting almost all the houses of Medellin, Cali, and Bogota with lots of lighting and pyrotechnics. We also light up candles and lanterns all around their home to form a path."

2. What is Santa called in your country?

Answer: "His name is Santa, just as it is in the United States. In Colombia, he is a gentleman, has a beard, he is very kind, and listens to the children. The children tell him the gift they want.

3. What is your favorite Christmas meal?

Answer: "My favorite food is Lechona, which is made of rice, arepa, and meat."

4. Does it ever snow during Christmas? Is it common for it to snow during Christmas?

Answer: "It never snows during Christmas. In Colombia, there are no seasons because it is a tropical country. We always have a green Christmas."

5. Do you ever decorate a Christmas tree?

Answer: "Yes, of course. In Colombia, you buy a tree and decorate it however you like."

6. Does Santa ride on a sled and go down the chimney or does he arrive to your house differently?

Answer: "In Columbia, Santa does not give them the gifts, it is God who leaves them for the children."

7. Do people go to Mass on Christmas? What is Mass like there?

Answer: "Yes, people go to Christmas on the 24. We also donate gifts to the church and they give it to the homeless."

8. On what day do you celebrate Christmas?

Answer: "We celebrate Christmas on the 24, and we receive our presents at 12 a.m. in the morning on the 25th."

Interview Questions:

1. Who was your hero or your role model as a child?

Answer: "My role model is my mom because she supports me in what I do."

2. Did your family ever go on vacations? Where did you go?

Answer: "Yes, I did go on vacations. I travelled to Panama, Venezuela, Aruba, Curacao, Miami, Orlando, New York, Spain, Italy, France, and Manhattan. My favorite place to visit is Italy.

3. Did you play any sports? If you did, what was your favorite sport?

Answer: "Yes, I play basketball, soccer, swimming, and golf. My favorite sport is soccer."

4. What is your favorite subject in school? Answer: "Math."

I made a PROMISE to myself at the beginning of the school year that I would perform an act of kindness EVERY DAY until graduating 8th grade. This is to ensure that even throughout the pressures and stress of my 8th grade year; I may still remain on my journey with God in daily life. In fifth grade students started Genius Hour. Genius Hour is based on a principle started by Google, where students are given one hour a week to research a topic they are passionate about. The topic cannot be answered in one google search, and must be centered on their gifts and talents.

Students in grades 4 and 5 social studies have engaged in project-based learning so far this year, honing their criticalthinking skills and tapping into their creativity. They have researched a variety of topics, analyzed information, created presentations using the Chromebooks, written interesting scripts and skits, designed posters, debated with their peers, and many other tasks!

The students enjoyed the outdoors completing team-building obstacle courses, sitting around a bonfire and exploring the natural wonders of the area. Students began with watching a video to learn more homelessness about in Cleveland including the living conditions of the homeless on Cleveland's streets. Students worked on different prototypes that



fit within one of the following categories: portable housing, food storage, and clothing/sleeping gear. They used cloth material/felt and space blankets and tested these during science class. Results displayed the temperature increasing while testing the use of the space blankets and material! Students are discovering solutions for real world problems and learning how to implement their ideas into positive change for others!
